Armin Albert Roth 14 July 1936 to 13 July 2017

A "Celebration of Armin's Life" was held at the Concordia Club in Tempe on 20 July 2017. Armin Roth had passed away a day before his 81st birthday, some two months after having been diagnosed with multiple inoperable brain tumours. More than 300 people crowded into the Club to farewell an exceptional man. Among them were family and friends, members of the Swiss community, and colleagues from a career spanning nearly 50 years with Henry Schein Halas Dental.

Speakers included work colleagues and associates, Michael Clavin, Hamish Shah, Phil Jolly and David Wing. Swiss community speakers included Daniel

Frutiger, President of the Swiss Club of NSW; Uschy Suter, Treasurer of the Swiss Community Care Society and Peter Meury, longtime friend and former President of the Swiss Community Care Society. Last but not least were words from his children and one of his granddaughters from Switzerland. The President of the Concordia Club, Karl-Heinz Füsting, opened proceedings with a heartfelt eulogy on Armin's lasting legacy and the immense knowledge and generosity he showed when working with different communities.

Summaries of some of the speeches follow:

Armin's Personal Life, delivered by his children and granddaughter.

Armin Roth, the fourth son of Carl Josef Roth and Anna Merz, was born in Zürich on 14 July 1936. He grew up in the heart of the old town which then housed mainly tradesmen, who fascinated Armin. His first paid job as a boy was delivering newspapers. He took pride in learning the nooks and crannies of his city. After completing compulsory schooling, he began an apprenticeship in merchant business at Maschinenfabrik Oerlikon, a manufacturing and engineering company. During this period - at age seventeen - he met his future wife, a fellow apprentice, Elisabeth Rey. A year in Lausanne to refine his French followed, and another in London for his English. Armin worked for Foyles Bookstores in the UK which is where he made connections with Australia and was offered a job with Ramsay Surgical. In June, 1960, at the age of 24, Armin embarked at Rotterdam on a ship headed for Melbourne. He asked Elisabeth to accompany him, but she had commitments with family and a sick mother. Two years later, on her 25th birthday, a bouquet of 25 red roses arrived from Armin, and Elisabeth and her mother agreed that it was time for her to join Armin down-under. Meantime, Armin had been transferred to Perth, where they were married in 1964.

The couple settled in Sydney in 1965 after a job offer by Halas



Dental, where Armin worked in various roles until the end of his working life at 73. They had four children, Dominik, Karolina, Caecilia and Veronika, and five lovely granddaughters.

The daughters reflected: Dad was always passionate about his work and travelled frequently. We always looked forward to his returning home, gathering around his open suitcase to see what exotic treasures he had brought back — a geisha doll or Hawaiian bikinis!

We loved to accompany him to the office on Saturdays, where we would sneak into the kitchen to find all

manners of goodies. There were drawers full of teeth and we would play in the dentist's chair. We would try out all the pens, sticky tapes, and every colour of liquid paper. (Belated apologies to those of you who returned to work on Monday to find your stationery wasn't exactly as you left it on Friday!)

Watching the start of the Sydney-Hobart Yacht Race was one of Dad's favourite events. He once confided that, as a boy, he had dreamed of becoming a sailor, traversing the oceans of the world. Dad also had a very selective love of sports. Having played soccer as a boy, the World Cup and FA Cup were key events. When in the hospital, he visibly brightened when we changed channels to the Tour de France.

He had a love of the outdoors, which could lift the heart and sooth the mind. Having grown up by Lake Zurich, Armin was an able swimmer, ever drawn to water. Like him, we all became keen travellers, our own trips inspired by returning to places important because of him: like visiting Foyles bookshop in London; hiking in the Swiss mountains where he toured in his youth; or strolling along the banks of the Limmat and the Altstadt in Zurich, where he grew up.

Every summer, until we started high school, we visited Jindabyne, where we would bushwalk, swim in the lake, admire the hydroelectric plant, and observe the construction of the skitube (featuring Swiss engineers!). We would inspect a trout farm, the thermal pools, and the Yarrangobilly Caves. He climbed Kosciusko every year, usually carrying the smallest among us on his shoulders. We remember every rest stop on the highway from Canberra to the Blue Mountains, to Newcastle. We all share fond memories of Swiss Club events – holidays at the Enzian lodge, preparing for the Swiss Ball, the Grümpeltournier, Metzgete, bushwalks, Yodlers' picnics, Swiss Christmas at the old Concordia, Sigi's accordion – not to mention packing Swiss Club News magazines, labelling envelopes and filling Santa Sacks!

Our education was important to our parents, who supported





us in whatever direction we chose. Dad was particularly proud when one of us graduated with a diploma or degree. He delighted in giving us an appreciation of fine art and music. He also had an excellent understanding of Swiss and European history, which he drilled into us (especially Die Schlacht am Morgarten!).

Armin's Professional Life, by Michael Clavin, with comments by Stanley Bergman, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Henry Schein, USA

Armin was widely respected and loved both by colleagues at Henry Schein Halas Dental, as he was by so many in the dental profession. A lifetime member of the Australian Dental Industry Association, he had a wealth of knowledge of the industry and was generous in sharing it.

His commitment to Halas Dental over years was legendary, helping to keep the team together through transitions and takeovers. Armin was deeply admired by colleagues and manufacturing partners for his warmth, kindness, his professionalism and a commitment to excellence.

Colleague, Gordon Anderson, said: "Armin is truly a legend in the dental world, and not just for Australia but the international stage. He was famous for his incredible memory of facts, a phenomenal filing system, and his 'common sense' and kindness. On anything dental—from the obscure to the 'only one ever made'—Armin knew where to find it. Armin was a mentor to many." A colleague, Anita Birkin observed: "Armin is one of few people who could walk the floors of the International Dental Show without a business card. He could only take a few steps before suppliers approached to greet him. Everyone knew Armin, a kind and careful negotiator, his product knowledge was like a walking Google. He will be sorely missed by friends at Henry Schein Halas."

Armin's Community Life, delivered by Peter Meury, Uschy Suter and Daniel Frutiger

Armin was the President of the Swiss Club of NSW for many years, and the Function Organiser on the Committee for even longer. In the early 1980s, the Swiss Club reintroduced the Swiss National Day Ball. Armin, with the late George Naher and a Ball Chairman, organised the event for a number of years. Armin long dreamed of a licensed Swiss Club in the city for the Community, and a survey put to members of the

Swiss Club offered two options: a Swiss Club in a city building acquired by the Club earlier under his leadership, or a country club/ski lodge. When a ballot was conducted, the younger generation lobbied strongly, and the lodge in Jindabyne won a slim majority, a disappointment to Armin.

Armin regularly contributed thoughtful articles and tributes to the Swiss Community News for which he was a treasure trove of knowledge. His input broadened the contents, added variety and opened the magazine to a wider community, rather than just to the members of the Swiss Club of NSW.

In 1998, Armin joined the Committee in the organisation of the National Swiss Folklore Festival with the participation of a Yodel Club from Switzerland; it was a huge success, though the workload was so immense that nobody has since tried to repeat an event of such scale. A Trustee of the Swiss Community Care Society in 1998, he joined the Committee in 1999 and was elected President in 2009, a position he held till his death. With Peter Meury, Armin worked tirelessly maintaining the society's Berowra property that it inherited in 1989.

Peter Meury declared that Armin exceeded every attribute famously lauded by the 19th Century American poet, Ralph Waldo Emerson:

"...to laugh often and much, to win the respect of intelligent people and the affection of children, to earn the appreciation of honest critics, to appreciate beauty, to find the best in others, to leave the world a little better place than we found it, in whatever way, to know even one life breathed easier because you lived, this is to have succeeded."

Uschy Suter reflected on an item in the book The Swiss in New South Wales — A History, which identified Armin as the Tribal Elder of the Swiss Community. A particularly apt description for the "go-to" man of the community, a figure so singularly informed of the history and background of all things Swiss in Australia. When practically any topic or name arose in conversation, Armin could add detail to any Swiss connection. Moreover, he had the natural talent of a diplomat par excellence with a consistently positive outlook. A figure of strong faith, he was a role model to many.

Until he fell ill, Armin drove every fortnight from Mascot to Blacktown to visit Erna Schweiberer, a 102 year old Swiss woman. He also drove to Frenchs Forest every month to support schoolmate Sigi Achermann and his wife Ruth. An especially moving moment during his final illness was when Beat and Esther Birchmeier, from the Swiss Community Care Society, collected Sigi and Ruth and drove them to Mascot to visit Armin, where they spent a few happy hours in friendship and camaraderie at his home.

Armin Roth was the doyen of the Swiss community for many years and his shoes will be very hard to fill. He will be long remembered as a kind, loyal and generous gentleman, who made a lasting contribution to both the dental field and the community.

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
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Message from the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney



Dear President, Committee and Swiss Club Members,

Thank you to the Swiss Club of NSW for this opportunity to write a few words. So here I am writing to say hello to you all and to introduce myself to those of you I have not yet met.

Nigel, my husband, and I arrived in mid-July 2017 from our previous posting. We are both very much looking forward to spending our next few years in Australia.

I was raised in Ebersecken in Switzerland and joined the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs in 1982.

After my consular training in Berne and Venice, I was subsequently transferred to the Swiss consular and diplomatic representations in New York, Rome, Canberra and Santo Domingo. From 1999 to August 2007 I was Deputy Head of Mission, as well as heading the consular and administrative sections of the Swiss Embassies in Wellington and in Maputo. I then spent two years as Counsellor and Deputy Head of Mission at the Swiss Embassy in Dublin before being appointed Consul General of Switzerland in Toronto in November 2009. In August 2013 I was transferred to Cape Town and now, in July 2017, I arrived here in Sydney.

Australia is not entirely new to both of us, as I was previously posted in Canberra and met Nigel during that posting. He had been living in Australia for more than ten years before I came along and took him away.

Coming back to this great and beautiful country is - for both of us - a really wonderful opportunity. I have already had the chance to meet some of you at the 1st of August celebrations in Castle Hill and am very much looking forward to meeting and working with you all for the next few years.

The Red and White Ambassador

A young boy named Jean-Claude has come a long way from Porrentruy in the Swiss canton of Jura to become a City of Sydney Cruise Ship Ambassador. The adventure started at the hotel of his mother's uncle, where he often helped out with various tasks till he definitely decided that hotels were where he wanted to make a career. As a good Swiss citizen, he absolved his military service, then successfully studied at the prestigious Ecole Hôtelière de Lausanne, and finally started his first job in a hotel in Villars. Over the next few years, work took

him to Saudi Arabia and then back to Geneva as Food and Beverage Manager at the famous Hotel des Bergues, where he met many VIPs and representatives of large international organisations.

In 1985, recruited by the Intercontinental chain, he arrived in Sydney. Being involved with the opening of a local new 5-star hotel represented a big challenge, but Jean-Claude was also attracted by the beautiful historic building and its mix with a modern annex. But it was less than one year later that he moved north, when a new posting as Assistant General Manager was created especially for him, on tropical Hayman Island, re-opening as a brand new resort after a complete reconstruction.

The next step was going back to reality after island 'troppo' life. Once again recruited, in 1990 he became Resident Manager at today's Four Seasons Hotel (then The Regent), a venue which has also seen some of our Swiss National Day Balls.

Jean-Claude's career did not end there. Thanks to his great experience, he was called to open the new Rex Hotel in Potts Point, then to run the 4-star Coogee Sands Hotel and Apartments, and help out YWCA with the management of its 2 Y hotels as well as with their preparations for a major refurbishment. In between, he managed to take charge of the operations for the late Italian fashion designer Gianni Versace Exhibition in Sydney in 2000.

Now it's time to take it easier and Jean-Claude has retired from his career as hotelier. But that doesn't mean he sits around in slippers and watches TV. Oh no! Travel is his passion, and for several months each year, he explores new territories. One of his other hobbies can easily be combined with his trips, he is also a keen photographer and wherever he goes, he tries to catch the essence of a place, the local vibe. He says 'I am not that interested in animals, but people and typical scenes of the places we visit, the history of the moment.'



Incidentally, I can tell you another secret about Jean-Claude: he makes his own sourdough bread. And sings in a choir. And is a volunteer at Life House in Camperdown, where help and assistance is given to cancer patients and their families.

Besides all these activities, Jean-Claude feels he would like to share and give back some of his knowledge and experiences acquired over all those years in the hospitality industry. For this reason, in 2016 he joined an exciting project launched by the City of Sydney, together with Destination NSW and Sydney Ports: Cruise Ship Ambassador.

According to Port Authority of NSW, a record 344 cruise ships (up from 311 last season) visited Sydney in the 2016/2017 season, meaning that about half a million passengers arrived on the city's shores either at the Overseas Passengers Terminal in the Rocks or the White Bay Cruise Terminal in Rozelle. Certainly a highlight for Sydney was the arrival of the newly launched mega liner 'Ovation of the Seas', a 348m long and 168'000 tonnes vessel, carrying some 5'000 passengers. It is a fact that cruising is a major tourism sector in Australia, and Sydney has become a very popular destination for international visitors. Yes, Australians also love to cruise, however, it is mostly the visitors from other countries near and far who need advice and information when they first arrive here. This is where the Ambassadors step in. They are specially trained volunteers and greet the ships at the terminals, armed with brochures and maps, a friendly smile and keen to pass on their extensive local knowledge. Jean-Claude is one on the team of about 80 Ambassadors and just loves his activities. The three most asked common guestions asked are: Wi-Fi? ATM? Luggage? But after that, the visitors are grateful to get tips on shopping and playing, on world class restaurants and bars, on sightseeing and museums and theatres and parks, and maybe even hidden little secrets off the beaten track or in the neighbourhood of one of the Ambassadors. Between October 2017 and April 2018, you might see a tall gentleman in a fetching uniform of a wide brimmed white hat and red shirt (incidentally the official Swiss colours) down at the OPT. Ask him anything about Sydney, it can also be in French or German or Italian, find out where Jean-Claude Niederer wants you to go and experience what our city has to offer and give you the best options of how to use your available time.



Council Meeting of the Swiss Abroad

The four Australian CSA
Delegates, duly elected in
June 2017, were officially
inducted at the Council
Meeting of the Swiss Abroad
on 18 August 2017 Basel.

About 50% of the worldwide 140 Delegates were said to be new members to the Council, so, a lot of "get-to-know each other" went on to make new acquaintances.

The newly elected Delegate from Brisbane is Mrs Katja Wallimann Gates, and the three incumbents: Carmen Trochsler (Adelaide), Roland Isler (Melbourne), Beat Knoblauch (Sydney).

The meeting wanted to hear from the Australian experience, i.e. how the direct electronic voting system worked for the selection of candidates, then for the elections themselves: in a massive effort, all those Swiss registered with the Swiss General Consulate in Sydney with an email address were informed by several emails by the ASO and the Consulate General on the forthcoming election and presented the eight candidates and relevant voting papers. Participation worked out to be some 7.5 % of those eligible to vote, which is a good start for a new voting system. It also

proved that the electronic voting system was easy to handle. The Canton of Geneva was very helpful in making the system available to us.

At ASO level, the debate is still on whether only those Swiss Abroad registered to vote in Switzerland are eligible to vote on ASO Delegates, or, as in the test case Australia, whether all Swiss registered with an email address with the Consulate General should be able to vote: I argued a strong case for the Australian experience, as it is a different matter whether you vote on Swiss matters or whether you elect your direct Representative at ASO level.

The Basel meeting endorsed strongly various motions, measures as to the ever burning issue of Bank Accounts of the Swiss Abroad: subsequently, Parliament passed various initiatives, thus proving that a concerted effort and continuous pressure on the Parliamentarians ultimately bring some result. But not all political parties in Switzerland actively support the Swiss Abroad issues, some are vehemently against. Your Delegate made the suggestion to the ASO Committee to work out a table for the next Federal Elections in 2018, to list those parties endorsing or not endorsing or supporting the causes of the Swiss Abroad, after all, some 775'000 Swiss Abroad can make a difference at the ballot box!! Progress is also noted in the number of Cantons enabling e-voting.

Generally, the Press in Switzerland was made aware of the plight of the Swiss Abroad and was reasonably supportive. The ASO in Berne is our best lobbying organisation and let's make good use of that!

The next CSA meeting will take place in Berne on Saturday, 10 March 2018, and the Congress of the Swiss Abroad will take place from 10–12 August 2018 in Visp (Valais). I plan to be there!



In this series the Swiss Community News look at the fascinating lives, experiences and motivations of Swiss immigrants.

Ruth Achermann has been an active member of the Swiss Club almost since the day she arrived in Sydney. She is well known for the work and boundless energy for the Swiss Club and Swiss Care Community.

What made you come to Australia?

My husband, Sigi had a two years' contract as an engineer with a Swiss company for a butter factory in Granville. When Sigi's company found out that he wanted to emigrate, they offered him this job in Australia. We arrived in Sydney in September 1959 by boat in first class. It was a wonderful trip. We had a stop-over in Egypt and rode on camels to the pyramids. We were young, just married and had been living in Geneva in a furnished unit. We had no furniture, only a fondue set and a few knives and forks.

After we arrived in Sydney we joined the Swiss Club in Stanmore and a few months later we were already managing it. Sigi played the accordion and I did the baking. The club was on the ground floor and we lived upstairs. It was a magnificent Federation building with a big lawn on the side. The members came every Wednesday to eat Buendnerfleisch or sausages with bread rolls or Nussgipfel. We also had ladies' lunches and I remember that there were a group of women who had arrived in the 1920s to do embroidery for a St. Gallen company. One of them brought me the book "Lady Chatterley's lover" which was banned in Australia, so she discreetly handed it to me in a paper bag. One day somebody came with a kangaroo skin and we told him that we would like to have one of these. We didn't hear anything for a long time until we received a phone call from the airport telling us that the kangaroo had arrived. I was wondering, what's going on? When we arrived at the airport, sure enough, there was a kangaroo, a joey, a real one, in a hessian bag. We were in shock, didn't know what to do. These Swiss guys had shot the mother and then sent us the



joey. We took it home and let it hop around on the lawn. It was adorable. But when it grew too big we gave it to a Swiss couple in the Blue Mountains. They already had a few kangaroos on their property and were happy to take care of it.

But then the Swiss Club got into trouble. We had quite a few functions like the Fasnacht where lots of people came, and they were noisy. Sometimes we had a full house with 50-60 people. You know, in those days the pubs closed at 6 o'clock and on weekends nothing was open so the Swiss definitely turned up. The neighbours complained because we were in a residential area so eventually the Club had to sell the place. With the money they bought a huge property in King Street in the city. Do you know what they then did? The committee sold that place and bought a ski lodge but it never worked. It was a huge mistake. Imagine how much the property in King Street would be worth these days! From then on they changed the Club laws so that all members, not only the committee, had a say in these things.

Where did you live after the Swiss Club building was sold?

We were building our house in Cabramatta where we had bought a block of land of about 900 m2. It was difficult to get a mortgage but finally we got it from a

building society. The builder was ok, he was Italian. It was a two-storey house with a big backyard and lots of fruit trees. Three years later we built a swimming pool. We were the first to build there. It used to be a farm that had been subdivided into building lots. Cabramatta in 1959 was way out in the countryside, a long way from the city. A lot of Germans and Italians were living there. Some Italians had market gardens and orchards. The Germans and Austrians built a big club house and we were members for quite a few years.

Our two boys went to a Catholic school which had an excellent reputation. The Kindergarten classes were run by nuns and the seniors by the Patrician Brothers. I used to make aprons for the school, Gugelhopf and cakes for fundraising events. The biggest nightmare came when I received a phone call from the school. Our 12 year old son. Michael had fallen down the stairs and was now in Liverpool hospital. He spent the next three months with his legs suspended and hips in plaster. Luckily he fully recovered and even continued to play football. We lived in Cabramatta for 40 years. It changed a lot after the Vietnam War in the '70s when the Vietnamese refugees arrived and slowly took over the shops and businesses.

You have always been very busy. What exactly did you do?

There wasn't a Swiss Care Society when we moved to Cabramatta but I knew quite a few elderly Swiss people, particularly the ladies in Ingleburn who used to come to the Club for lunches. I did the shopping for them once a fortnight. There was also a chap in a retirement village and another one in Parramatta who I visited regularly. I was also selling Swiss specialities like cheese, chocolate and Aromat at Club events. I knew an importer so we got everything from him. One day we even got "Mohrenköpfe" or "tete de negre". I had gone to a food exhibition and there was this man selling them, beautifully packed, like the ones in

Switzerland. I nearly fell over. He was from Eastern Europe and made them himself at his home in Sutherland. I ordered a few dozens for the next Swiss picnic. They sold out in a flash.

Like Sigi, I was employed by a food company in their cheese department. In fact, Sigi was officially my boss. I had a top job only working three days a week and never during school holidays. I had to

organise cheese degustations and made sure the sales girls were set up in the shops. I had girls in all the big suburbs and every Thursday and Friday they were handing out samples. The first day I started work, I was supposed to set up the table at their Liverpool store but that very morning the shop burned down to the ground. All the time I was travelling around a lot on public transport. One day my regular bus driver,



an Italian, mentioned that he had a driving school. I wanted to learn to drive so he came to our house with this blasted Holden, a manual which I couldn't handle. The following week he brought an automatic car; it was bliss.

When the company sold its cheese packaging division and the new owner subsequently closed down, Sigi decided to continue. He bought a second hand food packaging machine from an Italian coffee shop owner and with a business partner set

up a factory in Yagoona, near Bankstown. His wife did the paperwork and I helped downstairs on the factory floor. It was hard work, especially in the beginning but very rewarding. We sold the business in 2002, our house in Cabramatta a year later and then moved to Allambie Heights.

Yes, I have been busy all my life.

Was it difficult to move from Cabramatta to Allambie Heights after 40 years?

I have no regrets about moving into the retirement village. We already knew some residents here from our time in Cabramatta.

Soon after we moved into our unit, I took over the kiosk from a German woman who had retired. We did well, it was a good business. A lot of Germans came, also from outside, to buy specialities like chocolate and marzipan. Eventually, I had to give up because of health issues. I had a big operation where I lost one kidney. That was about seven years ago and took me a long time to recover.

Sigi gave up his driver's licence but I am still driving. I have a little car and drive to Aldi every two weeks or to the little shopping centre down the road. Here at the retirement village I help a few elderly ladies and I have also done a lot of bush regeneration. There is now a lovely bush track right next to our unit. We go for a walk every day or just sit on the balcony to enjoy the afternoon sun.

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How long before all Swiss expats can use e-voting?

The use of electronic voting in Switzerland has been making slow progress amid setbacks over security concerns. The Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA) is pushing for the introduction of e-voting for all Swiss expats by the next parliamentary elections in October 2019.

Critics complain that the number of cantons offering their registered Swiss citizens abroad the option of e-voting falls short of expectations.

In all, 775,000 Swiss citizens live overseas and if you consider that e-voting trials using online technology have been underway since 2004, the number of potential beneficiaries is rather modest.

About 158,000 expats from eight cantons (see map below) have the option of participating in the September 24 votes on the controversial old age pension reform, food security and some cantonal issues using a secure computer programme. Eighteen other cantons, including the populous cantons of Zurich and Vaud, do not offer e-voting.

Last April, the government decided to gradually expand e-voting, giving it a solid legal basis beyond the trial phase.

The 26 cantons are responsible for implementing an e-vote system, while the Federal Chancellery is merely coordinating and overseeing the introduction.

Swiss expats – all Swiss?

In theory, all citizens — both abroad and Swiss-based - should be allowed to use e-voting one day. At the moment, the goal is for at least two-thirds of the country's 26 cantons to have e-voting in place by 2019, according to Federal Chancellor Walter Thurnherr.

The OSA is more ambitious. It wants all cantons to offer their registered Swiss expats the possibility to cast their vote electronically by the same date.

Two years ago, the organisation appeared to be on track with more than half the Swiss cantons offering e-voting. But in August 2015 the government put the brakes on, blocking the use of an e-vote system developed by a United States IT company.

The government said the system had serious security flaws and failed to guarantee voting secrecy. Critics have also raised concerns about attacks by computer hackers trying to manipulate the result of a vote or an election.

Popular

Currently two certified systems — one developed by a Spanish company on behalf of Swiss Post and another by canton Geneva - are in operation. Both are competing to win additional contracts from the cantons which have not yet decided.

Voting online enjoys considerable popularity. A survey published by the Centre for Democracy Studies a year ago, found that more than two out of three respondents would like to see e-voting for all citizens.

For its part, the government says 67% Swiss expats voting in nationwide ballots prefer e-voting over other options. This means that they do not have to come back to Switzerland to cast their vote at a polling station or send in their ballot sheets through the post and risk missing the deadline.

Australia's Independent Brewing Boom

The number of independent brewing companies operating in Australia has tenfold over the last decade, even the newly refurbished local clubs have now their own Brewery and sell it on tap. Gone are the days where you have just the most common beer brands on offer, cleverly promoted local brews are ready to meet the current trend.

In 2016, there were just 30 independent brewing industries which have blown to a staggering 380 just 10 years later, highlighting the trend in small to large operations. 65% of all independent brewers are located in either regional or rural Australia which provides much

needed employment in regional or remote areas. It seems that most young patrons are in favour of these changes and support the idea, even though only 3% of beer consumed nationwide comes from independent breweries. Local clubs have spent a lot of money to set up their own breweries in the hope customers will support them for the long haul. In order to continue to grow the independent brewing sector in line with similar examples overseas, improved Government support is required in terms of current tax setting with regards to lowering excise levels and providing subsidies similar to these assisting small wine producers.





Beer Batter: serves 6 Ingredients

- 6 flathead fillets
- 250 self-rising flour
- Extra virgin olive oil
- 125 ml light beer
- Sea salt black pepper
- 250 ml cold water
- 12 lemon slices

Culi-Temp Recipe

Flathead fillets in Beer Batter Method

To make the batter, whisk all ingredients until smooth. Cover and refrigerate overnight (best results).

Dip the fish fillets into the batter to coat and fry until golden brown on both sides. Place cooked fillets on paper to drain while you cook the next batch. Serve the battered flathead with salt and pepper. Flathead fillets are expensive but can easily be substituted with any white fish fillets. Serve with a mixed salad to enjoy something simple and fresh for the warmer days to come.

PIPILOTTI RIST Sip my Ocean

1 NOVEMBER 2017 -18 FEBRUARY 2018

Pipilotti Rist was born in Grabs, Rhine Valley, Switzerland, in 1962. The second of five children, her given name is Elisabeth Charlotte Rist. When she left home at 19 she began introducing herself as Pipilotti. This was a combination of her childhood nicknames — Lotti, from her second name, and Pippi, after the children's book character Pippi Longstocking, known for her quirky character and extraordinary strength.

Rist studied at the University of Applied Arts in Vienna and Basel School of Design. She rose to prominence in the mid-1980s and 1990s with her single-channel videos, including *I'm Not The Girl Who Misses Much* (1986) and *Pickelporno (Pimple Porno)* (1992). Her work *Ever Is Over All* (1997) was awarded the Premio 2000 for outstanding achievement at the Venice Biennale in 1997. In 2009 she was awarded the Joan Miró Prize by the Fundació Joan Miró, Barcelona for her outstanding creativity. For her first feature film, *Pepperminta* (2009), Rist won the Extraordinary Award from the President of the panel of judges of the sixth Seville European Film Festival in Spain, and in 2010 the Cutting the Edge Award from the Miami International European Film Festival. In 2012 Rist was awarded the Harper's Bazaar China Art Prize; in 2013 the Zurich Festival Prize; and in 2014 the Prix Meret Oppenheim.
