

President's Message

Dear Swiss Club Members and Friends.

I hope you all had a safe and enjoyable Easter break with nice weather, good food, and view of the spectacular full moon at night wherever you might have been.

The 9th Australian National Jass Tournament was held for the first time in Darwin, Northen Territory, on the 8-10th June long weekend. The organising team from the Swiss Society of Queensland Inc. (SSQ) had anticipated strong representation from all states and territories to acknowledge their effort and work in hosting this event, particularly as they are doing so, with far less local Swiss support at the 'top end' of Australia compared to the larger, better funded states. My gratitude and thanks goes to the 2019 SSQ organising team for continuing to make this increasingly popular event possible. This year as usual, New South Wales had a strong and keen group of Jassplayers to represent our state and support the Tournament. The recent Free Swiss BBQ at Bronte Beach for our members attracted 46 adults and their children, who enjoyed the wonderful weather conditions (good enough for a swim), friendly company to network with, and of course the BBQ food. This low-key but enjoyable event is increasing in popularity each year, and we are thankful for the support of our Swiss community. Indeed, the event is also successful in attracting and connecting young and energetic couples and families who are either here in Sydney on a working holiday, studying or are expatriates of Switzerland. In fact, about half of the event's attendees were not SCNSW members, and so the event made for a good opportunity to showcase what we, as a Swiss club and community, can offer these people throughout the year.

As in previous years, the Wild Mushroom Foraging event beyond the Blue Mountains was completely booked out, with approximately 35 enthusiastic foragers attending. We met at the Victory Theatre Antique Centre & Cafe in Blackheath for breakfast and then journeyed to Hampton State Forest where wild mushrooms grow in abundance. Everyone left with a basket full of wild mushrooms to take home with them. Again, the SCNSW provided a delicious risotto with mushrooms, cooked in the forest for the group

Montreux on Lake Geneva - the place to be this Swiss summer

Montreux will again not only host the the annual Montreux Jazz Festival this year, but also the 97th Congress of the Swiss Abroad.

The Montreux Jazz Festival is held annually in



late June to early July on the Lake Geneva shoreline. It is the world's second largest annual jazz festival after Canada's Montreal International Jazz Festival.

The Festival was founded in 1967 by Claude Nobs, Géo Voumard and René Langel with considerable help from Ahmet and Nesuhi Ertegün of Atlantic Records. The festival was first held at Montreux Casino. It lasted for three days and featured almost exclusively jazz artists.

In December 1971, the Montreux Casino burned down during Frank Zappa's performance. The festival was then held in other auditoriums in Montreux, until it could return to the rebuilt new Casino in 1975. The festival continued to grow, and has since spread out to several different venues in Montreux and lasts for 12 days.

Over the years, more than 1,300 musicians, many of which are world famous, have performed at the Festival which attracts more than 200,000 music fans each year.

Thanks to a varied social program including sightseeing and excursions across the host region, the participation in this event promises a unique experience.

During the Congress, all speeches and sessions are held in German or French.

High Tea at Parliament House. Beat Birchmeier, our talented coordinator, organized another most interesting event which took place on Friday, 8th of March. About fifty participants met at lunch time in front of the NSW Parliament House in Macquarie Street. Many of us had never been inside this building although the public is allowed to enter it on most days of the year between 9am and 5pm. There are indeed many things to admire once you have gone through the security check. The quite dark old part facing the street is as magnificent as the bright new section at the back with a very impressive contemporary fountain in the middle and a gallery of very beautiful modern artworks.

At midday we were asked to enter the Jubilee Room, a historic and very ornate place. Originally the library, it was rebuilt in 1905 in Edwardian style and now contains floor to ceiling bookshelves full of parliamentary tomes, intricate woven carpets and a stained-glass ceiling. Here we were served High Tea in very elegant fashion. A glass of sparkling wine was followed by delicious treats, savoury and sweet. No need to say that this High Tea was our lunch.



After the wonderful meal, Dr. Bettina Boss gave a talk about the photos displayed around the room, some of which are again reproduced in this magazine. This collection of eleven pictures taken at the beginning of the 20th century is most relevant to the Swiss community. The subjects in these photos are Swiss which can be seen from their attributes, club names, costumes etc. However, the

question remains: Who exactly are these people? Will it eventually be possible to find out their identity or at least the identity of some of them? At this stage we are just lucky that Elisabeth Roth acquired and therefore preserved this treasure for us Swiss in NSW. We showed our gratitude to her with flowers.



The concert at the Opera House on April 5th, organised by Ursula Mooser, was an equally pleasant outing. We enjoyed one hour of the extremely varied and beautiful organ music, performed at the grand organ in the Concert Hall by David Drury. Then we went downstairs to have lunch at the "Portside" restaurant. The two-course meal, wine and coffee were delicious, the venue was perfect, the view out to the harbour and the bridge amazing as always, and the company, well, what do you expect when about 50 Swiss are out and about enjoying themselves! *RS*

The Hawkesbury Valley Heritage Tour on the 8th of May was a delightful outing, a sunny day enhancing the drive. Meeting at Central station, cluttered with building works, was a little challenge for some,; the driver, however, was patiently waiting for us all.



We picked up some guests at Strathfield station, before driving west, the driver adding local information while Swiss music played in the bus. In Windsor we welcomed our knowledgeable guide Carol Roberts on board, commenting on some historic houses as we passed. In Ebenezer at Australia's oldest church, established in 1809, which was the first non-conformist then Presbyterian Church in Australia, Morning tea of homemade scones, homemade jam and cream was served by local volunteers. Time allowed us to visit the church on the peaceful flowing

Hawkesbury river, while listening to the call of Bellbirds, and we visited the cute school where ladies were selling jams, honey etc. Meandering on through horse and wine country, enjoying the view Arthur Streeton painted many years ago, we arrived at Tizzana Winery. While enjoying a tasty lunch accompanied by locally produced wine, Peter Auld gave a talk on its history.



Tizzana was founded by Dr Thomas Fiaschi, a remarkable Italian polymath who arrived in the district in the 1870s. Not only was he an outstanding surgeon but he also showed an interest in viticulture. He planted vineyards on the Hawkesbury as early as 1882.



After finishing lunch with a complimentary glass of Old Liqueur Sweet White and having made some purchases, we proceeded to visit the historic St Matthew's Anglican church in Windsor. Here the group bid goodbye to our guide Carol before taking a photo of some of our 26 participants. We returned to Sydney around 5pm reflecting on a pleasant day out.

Thank you to Beat Birchmeier for organising the outing as well as to our guide Carol Roberts for the informative talk and our competent driver. *EB*

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Vale Brother Hugo (Eugen) Andrey SVD (1939 - 2018)

Hugo Andrey was born on April 6, 1939, the 11th child of Franz and Christine Andrey-Nussbaumer in Selgiswil near Heitenried, FR. He and his thirteen siblings experienced a happy childhood on their farm in Balliswil near Düdingen. In 1954 he went to the Gymnasium Marienburg in Thal. As he preferred working with the brothers on the farm of the Gymnasium than studying, he decided to become a brother.


In 1958, he entered the novitiate of the Steyl missionaries in St. Gabriel, Maria Enzersdorf in Austria, where he took his first vows on September 8, 1960. He then returned to Marienburg and graduated his training as a farmer in Kusterhof, Rheineck in 1961/62.

In 1963, he received the missionary

determination for Australia. The ship sailed from Genoa via Sri Lanka to Sydney, Australia. First he worked in Marburg and later in Kellyville near Sydney on a dairy farm. In 1966, he joined the religious community there with the eternal vows. From 1967 until 1981 he ran this farm with about 700 cows and then moved to Singleton. His anecdotes and stories from this period show his great love for the cows and his activities on this large farm. No work was too labourious or too much for him. The 1st of August celebrations of the Swiss community of Sydney were held on the farm with a bonfire, yodeling and the alphorn, which he liked to play himself.

On April 6, 1984, he moved to Papua New Guinea, where In the same year he experienced the visit of Pope John Paul II in Mt. Hagen. In Kondiu he managed the school farm of the De La Salle community. He took over the direction of the school's wind music group — he himself having had played the trumpet in Marienburg — and performed with them on various occasions.

In 1987 he was appointed head of the postulants (Order candidates). After his preparation in the Philippines, he



moved with them to Karap. He and his postulants committed themselves to the people of the area, and also held word worship and Bible classes. In the six years he was in charge, eight young men decided to become Steyler missionaries and today work in different countries of the world.

From 1994 to 2011 he worked at the Divine Word University in Madang, only interrupted by the time as Rector in Sydney from 1999-2002, where he had to operate both his hips. Initially he was responsible for the logistics of 500 students which then increased to around 1,400. At any time, day or night, he would pick up students or professors from the airport, or drive the sick to the hospital. He played the alphorn with great enthusiasm, be it at greetings or

at funerals and also organised talks in prison.

During his time in Madang he wrote about the history of Madang but also about Nicholai Maclay, the first white researcher in Papua New Guinea. For all his services in Papua New Guinea, he received the "Grand Companion of the Order of Logohu", the highest award given by the government.

In early 2012, he returned to Switzerland to spend his old age in Maria Hilf, Steinhausen. But "retiring" was out of the question. He made himself useful wherever he could, in the garden, in the kitchen, packing, etc. Contact with his siblings and relatives and the regular visits of our confreres in the nursing home in Menzingen were important to him.

After a short illness, brother Hugo Andrey SVD died on 26. September 2018 in the nursing home Franziskus in Menzingen.

The farewell service for Brother Hugo Andrey was celebrated on Saturday 6th October in the Don Bosco Church in Steinhausen and the funeral took place in the cemetery Erli.



Memories of Gabrielle Gardner



Mum grew up as the middle daughter of three sisters. Her sister Daisy being the eldest and Claire was the youngest. Daisy and Mum were very close, but kids will be kids, it was always two against one. This seemed to have a great influence on her life, hence the legend of the three aboriginal sisters in the service booklet.

They grew up in a town called Will in Switzerland, and when Opa Braun received a placement in the bank, the

family moved to the lakeside town of Rorschach. This was just before the breakout of World War Two. The family managed to catch the very last running train from Will to Rorschach to their new home above the bank, as Opa Braun was called up into the Swiss army to defend the border. Mum often talked about watched the bombing of Germany, on the other side of the lake, through their front window.

Teenage years were not easy at this time of restriction but Mum managed to enjoy a prolific exchange with penfriends throughout Europe. Her penfriends came from all over Europe, from Holland, Egypt, France, Sweden, Finland and Germany as well as within Switzerland.

Mum studied at business collage to achieve her secretarial skills giving her the freedom to earn her own money. She was extremely proud of her shorthand skills in three languages.

Her career started to take off when she joined Alcan, Aluminium Werke Rorschach, a worldwide company. It was here she found great friends and through contacts made her way to the Head office of Alcan in Bambury, England. It was here that she perfected her English language skills.

Well, it didn't take long for her be noticed by a young metallurgist called Bill. Mum being as she was, was at first wary of this handsome young man. Get him to cook you a meal, meet his mother and watch how he treats her, all before you commit yourself, was her advice. She finally realised he was a good sort and Mum and Dad married in 1956, in Switzerland. They lived in a flat, in Sulgrave near Bambury, England, where Nicholas was born

Dad saw an opening for a job with Alcan Australia so the young family prepared to migrate, lock stock and barrel. During that time Richard was on the way so it was decided that Mum was to go back to her parents to await the birth while Dad went on ahead to Australia. Mum loved to tell the story when Richard was born; her Dad accompanied her to the hospital and the nursing staff mistook Opa Braun as the father of her new born, 'no he's my Dad' she said.

In Sydney the young family was reunited, living first in Clareville on Pittwater and then moving to Melbourne where I and Paul followed in quick succession.

After Dad acquired a position in Granville Plant of Alcan in Sydney, we moved to a newly built house in Carlingford. Our childhood was full of happy memories of boat and sailing trips, camping trips up and down the coast as well as the privilege of a good solid education, with Mum being the solid rock in the background, teaching us life skills as well instilling in us Christian values. Mum was a great cook, always looking to improve; her famous pork and cabbage cream dish was a great family favourite.

As we were growing up, Mum worked as a school secretary, firstly at our primary school and then at Rydalmere East public school. The head mistress was impressed when Mum could pull out files that she needed within minutes. Here she was in her element and made some lifelong friends.

Mum had many international friends living in Australia and shared many interests together such as going to the opera, a love of international food and their shared love of travelling. Having studied French at school, it became a desire to improve her skills which she did by engaging a retired French teacher who later became one of her dear friends. Whenever we played scrabble with her, she would often have the French word before the English word, after using this as a means to solidify her French language vocabulary.

Her ongoing passion was the garden; Dad's job was the vegetables, her's was the flower garden. You could find her there early mornings pottering about. Interior design was another interest that she pursued, making cushions and things for the house, making it a lovely home to grow up in. Another passion was watercolour painting. Through various teachers she picked up her skills painting in the Lane Cove National Park and even on a trip to France and Nepal.

As we kids made our own way, Mum and Dad took to the road, travelling extensively throughout Australia, up and down the east coast and following where ever the trail took them and throughout the world. Visits to family in England and to my family in Switzerland and even to celebrating her 80. birthday in St. Gallen, Switzerland with her lifelong friends and family.

When Dad died, she moved up to Golden Ponds, where she spent the last 11 years of her life. Her interests lay in the activities outside the village. The weekly hairdressing visit was a must and a wander down Wharf Street with its boutiques and fruit shop. The breakwater was a favourite and a sit on the bench to watch the dolphins feeding was an interesting pastime. After she had to give up her licence, the village bus was her only means of transport but once registered with the Aged Care Assist at the Mid Coast council she received help from volunteers to get out and about, going on assisted lunch and day trips here and around. My hat goes off to these lovely people, giving Mum back, her much-loved independence and good company.

Mum was known as a strong, creative, elegant and intelligent lady, who knew just what she wanted and let you know it. Her never ending interest in everything, her strong mind set, her readiness to pass on her skills to us and to her grandchildren will always be part of our memory of Mum.

The first photo shows a mixed group of people, including many families, in front of a building which probably served as a "Festhütte", a party venue.

The next photo shows a group of men holding a more relaxed celebration held in some bushland setting, some of them holding musical instruments, suggesting that a musical performance has taken place at some stage.

The third photo features a group of men next to a building, which could be the private home of one of them. The man in the centre of the group seems to be the same as in two of photos published in the last issue, but we are no closer to identifying him.

So, as you can see, these photos not only shine a new light on the history of our Swiss community, but they also raise more questions and require further research. We will publish more photos in the next issue, hoping to encourage some of you to help with the task of solving some of the puzzles these images present. GREAT PASSION AT SWISS BUSINESS AWARDS CEREMONY

On a hot summer night in February, more than 130 members of the Swiss Australian business community gathered in the transparent pavilion anchored right next to the replica of James Cook's famous HM Bark 'Endeavour' at Sydney's Maritime Museum in Darling Harbour. The anticipation could be felt, who are the winners of the Swiss Business Award this year?

The award ceremony has become a firm part of the events program of SwissCham Australia. Each year, a committee formed by the Swiss Ambassador, the Consul General of Switzerland, the President of SwissCham, a representative of the main sponsor (Glencore from the very start of the event) and the president of SAAN, the Swiss Australian Academic Network, decide on the winners in 3 different categories. Focus areas for all categories include innovation, technology, design, quality, reliability, sustainability, originality, contribution to society and social responsibility, corporate or otherwise, and a Swiss connection.

Just like last year, a well-prepared MC, Charles Kovess in his distinctive red jacket, took the audience through the evening function and introduced each speaker, the whole procedure highlighted by 2 large screens for the interesting and informative Power Point presentations.

After an introductory address by Swiss Ambassador Pedro Zwahlen, and a video presentation by the main sponsor Glencore, the winner in the category 'Science/Technology/ Education' stepped up on the dais: Professor Robin B. Gasser. B vet med (University of Berne 1984), Dr med vet (Zurich 1989), PhD and DVSC (Melbourne), Dip EVPC (European Veterinary Parasitology College, 2004), Dr med vet hc (Bern 2013), Veterinary First Lieutenant, Swiss Federal Military Department Berne; these titles, and there are many more, indicate the most impressive background of Professor Gasser. Born in Camperdown, Victoria, but with a place of origin (Buergerort, as it is the tradition in Switzerland) of Ruederswil, canton of Berne, the dual citizen is a renowned researcher and teacher at the Faculty of Veterinary and Agricultural Sciences of the University of Melbourne. He and his team have been investigating socio-economically important parasites affecting humans and animals and how to develop intervention methods and effective drugs. Some of the pictures shown on the screens about the harm caused by parasites were just heartbreaking.

South Pole Australia Pty Ltd, the Australian subsidiary of Zurich head-quartered South Pole Group, was announced as winner in the category 'Newcomer/Rising Star'. The company is based in Sydney and Melbourne. Their expertise are climate, carbon and energy solutions, and the company offers consulting and marketing, sales and portfolio. Clients are helped with assessing their climate risks and opportunities, measuring and reducing their environmental impact, sourcing renewable energy and carbon offsets and supporting sustainability projects not only in Australia, but around the world. The passion about climate change, the importance of protecting our environment and finding useful solutions was very evident in the lively presentation.

In the next category, Established Business/Overall Winner 2018, the winner was Laros Technologies Pty Ltd in Fyshwick ACT. The elegant Swiss CEO of Laros, Dr Andreas Luzzi, introduced his high-performance building technology and the concept of 'Passive House'. Laros Technologies represents various European and international manufacturers and offers consulting services in collaboration with homeowners, architects, engineers and builders.

A very special Life Time Award was presented to Norbert Schweizer OAM, accredited business law specialist and public notary. Norbert has been on the Board of SwissCham since the Swiss Australian Chamber of Commerce was founded in 1985 and his devoted and loyal involvement as Honorary Secretary and Director has been exceptional. After 34 years of outstanding service to SwissCham, Norbert has just resigned from the Board, but will remain as member of the organisation.


An exhibition opening event is planned for 1st August 2019. Let's celebrate Swiss National Day in style!
